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Methodology

- Telephone Survey of likely November 2012
 Voters in Los Altos School District
- ▶ 402 completed interviews
- ▶ Margin of error <u>+</u> 4.89% points
- Conducted July 5-9, 2012
- Where applicable, results compared with:
 - Survey of Los Altos School District Voters
 Presentation Of Bond Measure Survey Findings
 - April 23-28, 2012
 - n=500; Margin of Error=<u>+</u>4.38% pts
 - EMC Research Telephone Survey of Likely 2010 Special Election Voters
 - **▶** December 1-6, 2010
 - n=400; Margin of Error=+4.9% pts


Key Findings

- Awareness of the need for space is higher than in the April Poll.
- Support for the bond, with stronger ballot language, is higher than in April. But, still starts at only 46% yes + 10% lean yes.
- After additional messaging support reaches only 57% including those that "lean yes".
- Support among LASD parents is higher than in the baseline, but is not high enough to counter low support from non parents.

If the election were held today would you vote yes to approve or no to reject a bond measure for Los Altos school district?





Awareness of the District's need for more money has not changed significantly


Would you say that the elementary and junior high schools in the Los Altos School District have a great need for more money, some need, a little need or no real need for more money? (Q4)

Awareness Segmentation based on responses to Q5 and Q6



April 2012


To support academic programs for local students by providing up to date educational facilities, ensuring student access to updated classrooms, technology, computer labs and school libraries, repairing existing classrooms and acquiring, constructing or equipping additional facilities and sites, shall the Los Altos School District issue \$120 million in bonds at legal rates with citizens oversight, annual audits and no money for administrator salaries.

July 2012

To support academic programs for local students, avoid overcrowding at schools, keep schools clean, safe and wellmaintained, provide updated learning technology, provide updated classrooms and labs, support small neighborhood schools, and acquire, construct or equip additional facilities and sites, shall the Los Altos School District issue \$120 million in bonds at legal rates with citizens oversight, audits and no money for administrator salaries.



Initial support for the measure is higher than it was in April, but still not significantly over the 55% minimum threshold











Support for the measure is especially higher among LASD parents








Support drops slightly after voters hear the reason for the measure

Given what you've heard, would you vote Yes to approve or No to reject the proposed bond measure for Los Altos School District? (Q10: vote 3)






The April explanation mentioned building a new school – possibly why opposition was higher in that poll



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
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Many bond projects are important to voters but with low intensity



However, more than 45% think building a new school is not important


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Attitudes about building a new school are unchanged compared to the April poll


Messaging





Finding a solution and ending the dispute is not compelling for many












Hearing potential projects and positive messages does not significantly increase support

Given what you've heard, if the election were held today would you vote yes to approve or no to reject a measure that reads:... (Q31)






Over a third find potential opponent messages about the charter school to be persuasive





Only half of voters vote Yes or lean Yes after hearing potential opponent messages


Now, given all that you've heard, if the election were held today would you vote yes to approve or no to reject a bond measure for Los Altos school district (Q34)


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


Voter Segmentation






Support levels are similar among both parents and non-parents and among both voters who indicated prior awareness of the Bullis Charter School situation and voters who did not






Baby-boomers are the least supportive






Support among Democrats is not high enough to counter opposition among Republicans

| Polling and the economic news signaled that price sensitivity was a factor. The district pursued a lower tax amount. | Price sensitivity does not appear to be a significant factor. |
| The district had a clear plan for use of the additional revenue. | The overall goal is clear, but the specifics of the plan have not been finalized. |
| The special, single-issue election was conducive to engagement with the community. | The environment of a presidential election makes it difficult to communicate about our issue. |
| 72% of LASD parents surveyed indicated support for a measure. | 63% of LASD parents surveyed indicate support for a measure. |
| There was widespread support for the district's priorities (core academics, teacher retention, instructional days, etc.). | There is low support for the highest priority (providing space for a school). |



Recommendations/Next steps

- Do not place a measure on the November 2012 ballot.
- Work towards reaching the following milestones by the Fall of 2013 in time to make a decision about a bond for June 2014:
 - A completed plan for addressing the space needs for the community's schools
 - A facilities plan that addresses the structural, safety and educational capital expenses for the community's schools
 - Strong identified support from stakeholders, the parent community and voters
